First Summer "Meeting" of 2010

The first meeting of the summer will be on Saturday June 5th at Chief Timothy, 7 miles west of Clarkston on Highway 12. The Club will be supplying burgers, dogs and beverages. Club members should bring a side or dessert to share (A-L bring a side or salad, M-Z bring dessert). Dinner will be around 6:00 pm

Richard Huggins has prepared two interesting programs for the weekend - the first will at 6:30pm and the second will be at 8:30pm.

Program One

The first will be a boater safety discussion with Sgt Kingsbury of the Asotin County Sheriff's Dept. Starting at 6:30 pm, the Program will be a Q&A of 20 to 30 minutes. Topics will include:

- * Equipment/training boaters are expected to have
- * Who to call in case of Emergency - Asotin/ Whitman County
- * Types of Incidents the Dept responds to
- * Information the Dept wants from a Caller
- * Emergency Services organizations who respond, their equipment, training
- * Other organizations responding to fuel, engine, towing, etc. issues
- * Expected response times
- * Communication recommendations beyond a cell phone and arm waving & shouting
- * First Aid training, equipment suggestions
- * Illustrative boating incident examples

Program Two

The second will be at 8:30pm and is a Star Party informally hosted by Ralph Aeschliman. Members of the Palouse Astronomical Society may be joining us.

First a "Star Party" doesn't involve people like Tom Cruise, or Jen Aniston and such. Rather it is a gathering of people who share an interest in the night sky who bring telescopes, binoculars or just their eyes to look at and find out more about those things that exist over our heads, which mostly are visible at night. If the weather looks at all promising I'll be bringing a telescope or two and we will be able to look at some of the things in the starry sky. Saturn is up and, for most of the night, the Moon is down -- which allows us better views of fainter objects.

Ralph will be setting up before dark (~8:30 to 9:30) and will be available to chat about sky stuff. Hopefully some other astronomy types will bring some of their equipment and we will have nice clear skies.

There's a lot going on! What better time to camp out and spend the night, either in a campsite or on your boat.
